 - I have often heard my male colleagues comment that women are not devoted to their work. They are not career-minded. They are too distracted running their homes and caring for their families.
 - Twelve years ago, when I began my career and spent most of my waking hours in the office I often disagreed with this assessment and said that they were stereotyping. I believed that women can be

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equally career-minded and apply themselves to the task at hand with the same diligence and sincerity that most (though not all) men do. Of course, like most such controversies examples can be given on either side of the argument.

- But as I grew older and interacted with a large number of male colleagues and friends of all ages from 21-year-old new recruits to much revered seniors close to retirement I began to discern a pattern. It was true that most men exhibited a "devotion" to work which had two striking dimensions.
- One was the almost compulsive need to put in long hours at work, irrespective of how productive or necessary that was. The second, which was logical fallout of the first, was that the devotion was achieved at the almost complete neglect of everything else. Not just of home, spouse, and family, who of course are affected, but also "distractions" that are necessary for one's own growth and self-development, be it an interest in music, theatre, painting, or cooking. I found the adage, "All work and no play makes Jack a dull boy" increasingly applicable to most of the men I encountered. I am not suggesting that excellence at work does not demand extra effort not only in terms of time but also in terms of emotional energy. The issue is one of balance.
- 5 And that is where I think the gender difference lies. My male colleagues were right. Women are different. They are able to do a lot more timesharing in their life than men can. They not only want to excel at work, but at the same time want to run an efficient and congenial home, find time for raising children, and maintain social relationships.
- They are not devoted to the pursuit of goals related to work alone. And for that reason I think, a lot of women who are trying, against many odds, to balance these multiple dimensions of their life, lead richer lives than most men do. They take interest in and can converse with an amount of ease about the stock market or marketing strategies for a new recipe, an art exhibition or a new store for children clothing! Try counting the number of men you encounter who exhibit such versatility.

2. Read the passage given below and answer the questions that follow:

The existence of oil wells has been known for a long time. Some of the Indians of North America used to collect and sell the oil from the wells of Pennsylvania. No one, however, seems to have realized the importance of this oil until it was found that paraffin-oil could be made from it; this led to the development of the wells and to the making of enormous profits. When the internal combustion engine was invented oil gained worldwide importance.

What was the origin of the oil which now drives our motor cars and aircraft? Scientists are confident about the formation of coal, but they do not seem to be so sure when asked about oil. They think that the oil under the surface of the earth originated in the distant past, and was formed from living things in the sea. Countless billions of minute sea creatures and plants lived and sank to the bottom of the sea bed. They were covered with huge deposits of mud; and by processes of chemistry, pressure and temperature were changed through long ages into what we know as oil. For

these creatures to become oil, it was necessary that they should be imprisoned between layers of rock for an enormous length of time.

The statement that oil originated in the sea is confirmed by a glance at a map showing the chief oilfields of the world; very few of them are far distant from the oceans of today. In some places gas and oil come up to the surface of the sea from its bed. The rocks in which oil is found are of marine origin too. They are sedimentary rocks which were laid down by the action of water on the bed of the ocean. Almost always the remains of the shells, and other proofs of sea life, are found close to the oil. A very common sedimentary rock is called shale, which is a soft rock and was obviously formed by being deposited on the sea bed. And where there is shale there is likely to be oil.

The king of the oilfield is the driller. He is a very skilled man. Sometimes he sends his drill more than a mile into the earth. During the process of drilling, gas and oil may suddenly be met at great pressure, and if they rush out and catch fire the oil well may never be brought into operation at all. This danger is well known and steps are always taken to prevent it.

There is a lot of luck in drilling for oil. The drill may just miss the oil although it is near; on the other hand, it may strike oil at a fairly high level. When the drill goes down, it brings up soil. The samples of soil from various depths are examined for traces of oil. If they are disappointed at one place, the drillers go to another.
